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Changes make for safer turns Watch leader

Several changes have been made to the intersection of Summit Drive and Beckett's Ridge Drive to make it safer.

Last winter, the Granview neighborhood homeowners' association asked the Town of Hillsborough to install a three-way stop at the intersection of Beckett's Ridge Drive and Summit Drive. The Granview neighbors were concerned about visibility for drivers who are turning left from Summit Drive onto Beckett's Ridge Drive. Many residents of Beckett's Ridge opposed the idea of extra stop signs.

In April, the Beckett's Ridge HOA Board met with the Granview HOA Board to discuss the proposal. Assistant Town Manager Demetric Potts, Hillsborough Chief of Police Clarence Birkhead and Hillsborough Police Capt. Davis attended the meeting.

A compromised was reached: The town has relocated the existing stop sign on Summit Drive so that it is closer to the intersection with Beckett's Ridge Drive. The town also repainted the stop stripes on Summit Drive. The Leyland cypress trees near the intersection have been trimmed to help visibility. No extra stop signs will be added.

If those measures do not take care of the problem, the HOA boards will meet again to discuss other options.

If you are a Beckett's Ridge gardener, you likely have encountered some deer, or at least the damage they leave behind. A couple of weeks ago, several branches were missing from one of our tomato plants -- not broken off in a storm, just

... gone! Another time, deer chewed up my winter pansies overnight. Our back yard is their cafeteria - they munch the day lilies, azaleas and camellias. And some gourmet deer helped themselves to a neighbor's herb plants.

Deer populations are rising in North Carolina at the same time that

neighborhoods such as Beckett's Ridge have pushed into their rural woodland habitats, squeezing their space for browsing for food. They're lovely creatures, and it's easy to understand why they're invading our yards, but let's face it—they can be real pests. Here are

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How to garden happily in the company of deer

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some tips to help you live with deer. (The suggestions came from a leaflet from Niche Gardens nursery (Chapel Hill) and from an information sheet by W. Royce Hardin, agricultural extension agent for Orange County. Many nurseries have free handouts about deer and other plant topics.)

Deer damage plants in two ways – by feeding on them (usually at night) and by rubbing against them (male deer rub their antlers against trees and shrubs from late summer through early winter). Here are ways to discourage them:

- Use deer repellent sprays these are usually plant-based, using strong scents or oils that deer don't like. I have used Deer Off (buy at Home Depot, Lowe's, nurseries, hardware stores, or www.havahart.com) and I Must Garden Deer Repellent (it is sold at Bailey's Inside-Out nursery on Old 86 near I-40, or order it from www.imustgarden.com.)
 - Hang perfume-y bars of soap in trees or shrubs.
- Organic fertilizers such as horse manure sometimes keep deer away.
- Fences, of course, but the fence needs to be at least 6 feet tall.
- Some plants repel deer they hate ornamental grasses, for example, and plants with a strong odor or thorns. If these are used around the perimeter of the yard, they might help.

When adding new plants to your yard, concentrate on those that deer (allegedly!) don't like. Some examples:

Trees and shrubs: American Holly, Birch, Butterfly bush, Boxwood, Chinese Holly, Forsythia, Honey locust, Japanese pieris (pieris japonica), Juniper, Ligustrum (Privet), Lilac, Mahonia, Nandina, Norway spruce, Pyracantha (Firethorn),

Pittosporum, Viburnum, Yucca

Perennials: Artemesia, Baptisia, Bee Balm, Columbine, Coneflower (Echinacea), Coreopsis, Dianthus, Ferns, Feverfew, Hellebores, Lamb's Ear, Lavender, Mint, Narcissus (Daffodils), Ornamental Grasses, Periwinkle, Rosemary, Russian Sage, Salvia, Sweet Woodruff, Yarrow

Annuals: Ageratum, Alyssum, Celosia, Cleome, Coleus, Cosmos, Digitalis, Heliotrope, Larkspur, Marigold, Nasturtium, Petunia, Salvia (annual), Verbena, Zinnia.

Hillsborough makes improvements to culvert

The Town of Hillsborough has repaired the storm water culvert on Beckett's Ridge Drive near Scotsburg Trail. The rock supporting the culvert was falling away and there was erosion near the sidewalk at that culvert. The town workers removed the rip-rap around the culvert and replaced it with concrete. They also put concrete underneath the sidewalk to reinforce it due to the previous erosion problem.

At this time, the Town has no specific standards in place that requires rip-rap or any other material to line a drainage ditch or storm water culvert. The town's only concern is preventing erosion and maintaining the flow of storm water. With that in mind, homeowners are welcome to submit architectural requests to the HOA Board if they wish to make cosmetic improvements (removing or adding rock, removing or adding planting) to the drainage ditches in the front or sides of their homes. Structural improvements to the ditches or culverts would have to be approved by the Town.

Please keep your ditches and culverts free of leaves, mud and debris so that water can pass through.

Rabies shots: North Carolina law requires that cats and dogs be vaccinated for rabies. Rabies is active in wild animals in our area. Here are some upcoming low-cost rabies vaccination clinics (a shot costs \$5 in cash). Dogs must be on a leash; cats must be in carriers.
