Early Egyptians also used a baby as a symbol of rebirth. Although the early Christians denounced the practice as pagan, the popularity of the baby as a symbol of rebirth forced the Church to reevaluate its position. The Church finally allowed its members to celebrate the new year with a baby, which was to symbolize the birth of the baby Jesus.

Around Town

On December 3rd, a developer approached the Town Board about building a 90 acre subdivision in between Beckett's Ridge and Millstone Business Park along the newly built extension. This has not been approved yet and will require a public hearing and Town Board vote. It is still in the early stages so we will all have an opportunity to express our thoughts on the project to the Town Board.

The Hampton Pointe Shopping center was approved by a 4-1 vote of the Hillsborough Town Board. Construction is expected to begin approximately six months from now. Significant improvements to Highway 86 will be constructed that include synchronized traffic signals at both entrance/exit ramps of I-85, NC-86 and Business 70, and at the entrance to the shopping center. In addition, extra turn lanes and a landscaped median will be built to allow for improved traffic flow. The first store is expected to open a year from now and is speculated to be a Super Wal-Mart which will include a grocery store component.

The old Southern States building has been bought by a family from Roxboro and will be converted into a steak restaurant named Heartland Steakhouse. It is expected to open by March 15th. A December 4, 2001 article in the Chapel Hill Herald states that the mid-upscale restaurant will seat between 330 - 350 people and will have a full-service bar and a separate space for banquets or meetings. Offerings besides steak will include pasta, pork, lamb, sautéed seafood as well as salads. The family has owned and operated two other area restaurants, Homestead Steakhouse in Person County and Mariner's Cove in Durham.
